Aims and Objectives

Aim: to review, evaluate and update the Elder Abuse Protocols: Guidelines for Action (APEA: WA, 2013)

Objectives:

- To gather data about the usefulness and effectiveness of the previous version of the Elder Abuse Protocols as well as stakeholder suggestions for improvement
- To review relevant literature and other similar documents in relevant jurisdictions and use this to inform an updated document

Research Process and Demographics

- Reviewed similar documents
- 3 Focus Groups (n=19)
 - APEA:WA (n=7)
 - Advocare (n=5)
 - WANPEA (n=7)
- Online Survey (n=44)
 - Frontline Worker 54%
 - Supervisor/Coordinator 20%
 - Senior Management 31%

Focus Group Themes

- **Document design and amendments:** target, purpose, design, other information and resources to include, future articulations
- **Effectiveness and usage of previous APEA: WA Protocols (2013)**
- **Elder abuse responses:** policies and procedures, reporting, organisational and service responses
- **Education:** support policies and procedures with education and training


Survey Findings

- Respondent's organisations with elder abuse policy, procedure or process:

Yes = 76% No = 17% Unsure = 7%

- Believed policy, procedure, process followed in 90% of cases
- 84% familiar with 2013 Elder Abuse Protocols
- 100% find it a useful document
- Suggestions
- Limitations

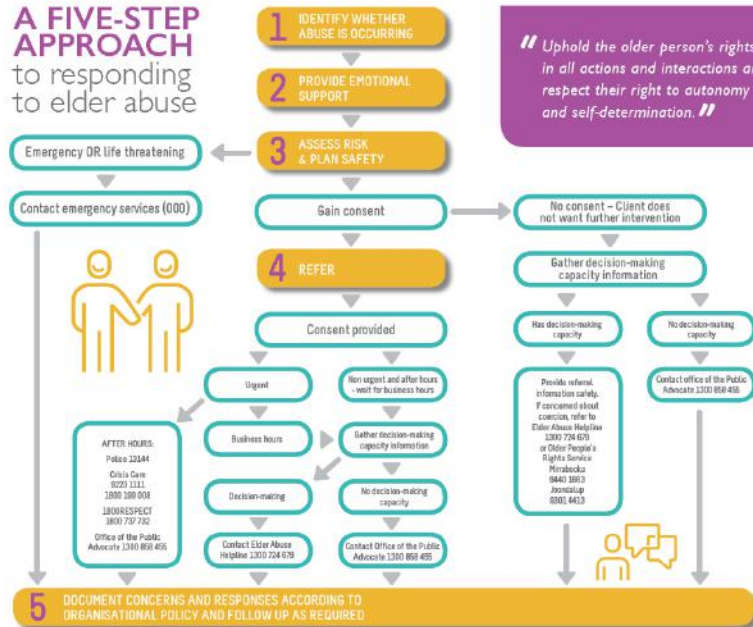

A FIVE-STEP APPROACH to responding to elder abuse



“ Uphold the older person's rights in all actions and interactions and respect their right to autonomy and self-determination. ”



Intervention principles

- Do no harm
- Accept what the older person is saying
- Do not escalate action unnecessarily
- Assess safety and risks and implement safety management plans
- Uphold the older person's rights in all actions and interactions and respect their right to autonomy and self-determination
- If you have doubts about the older person's decision-making ability, make appropriate referrals
- Recognise the importance of preserving family relationships where possible
- Responses should take into account the needs of the older person in relation to disability, culture, language, religion, gender, sexual and historical abuse and reporting experience
- Know your organisation's policies and procedures, including duty of care responsibilities
- Be aware of the potential for conflict of interest, especially in small communities or within service settings
- Be clear about your role in supporting the older person and do not be co-opted into other people's agendas
- Be informed about elder abuse and engage in training where suitable

Next Steps
